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Biosecurity

- 1. BQA guidelines will be followed for biosecurity.
- 2. Outside cattle will be quarantined upon arrival and not commingled until they have been deemed healthy and processed using products indicated in the Drug Listing.
- 3. The following pest control practices are implemented:

- 3. Cows are checked according to the following schedule during calving season.
- 4. Heifers are checked according to the following schedule during calving season.
- 5. If a calving problem occurs that cannot be corrected by the Supplier before the cow or calf's life becomes at risk, a veterinarian shall be contacted.
- 6. A list of all current feeds is attached.
- 7. A list of all current drugs used is attached.

Morbidity - Diagnosis & Treatment

- 1. In the event an animal becomes ill or suffers injury, it must receive prompt treatment, including veterinary care, if required.
- 2. A treatment record will be kept to define how sick animals are monitored and treated.
- 3. See the following table for a list of possible conditions, diagnosis procedures, and veterinary interventions.

Pain Management

- 1. Define pain management protocols for potentially painful procedures.
- 2. The veterinarian on record will oversee painful procedures on cattle over 6 months of age or as necessary.

Non-Ambulatory Cattle

- 1. Non-ambulatory cattle will be offered feed and water at least once daily.
- 2. Non ambulatory cattle required to be moved shall be done so with great care on a sled, low boy, or large bucket of a loader. To load, an animal shall be rolled into the bucket. Absolutely no dragging will be done.

Euthanasia / Mortality

1. Diagnosis that deems non ambulatory cattle are unlikely to recover due to observations of, but not limited to, their inability to sit up, no response to therapy, compound fractures or spinal injury, severe pain, refusal to eat or drink for 24 hours, etc, shall be euthanized humanely. Humane euthanasia methods as outlined in AABP's guidance document will be followed.

4. Post-mortem examinations will be conducted by the veterinarian on record if the cause of death is unknown.

Recordkeeping

- 1. A complete list of medications will be kept on site, to be administered as defined in the herd health plan.
- 2. Treatments and processing will be documented as they occur. An example of a current treatment record and processing record is available.
- 3. Dates for processing and treatment will be maintained.
- 4. Mortality logs will be kept tracking death, disposal methods, and veterinary evaluations.
- 5. Cattle inventory will be kept current.
